
Brief History of Service Stations¹

I recently received a 1937 photo of the Senator Garage located in Broderick, in West Sacramento.

As I was looking at the old gas station, I saw signs that advertised what they did other than pump gas. You could buy tires and tubes at the station. You could get your car 'greased' and buy Coca-Colas.

All of us remember when service stations did everything! I remember buying ice creams in the ice chests in front of the building. There were always old men sitting around and talking.



It's funny how a photo can trigger memories. In my years of travel I have seen remnants of old gas stations that look very similar to gas stations that are one stop shops where you can buy anything you want. I sometimes forget that history does change even in gas stations. So, let's look at the development of gas stations in this country.

Gasoline in the early 1900's was purchased in pharmacies, blacksmith shops and hardware stores. As these stores were already handling flammable substances, it made sense that they would sell gasoline, a byproduct of refining kerosene for lamps and stoves.

Gasoline was sold in 5-gallon containers. The buyer would bring his container to the shop,

> buy the gasoline and then use a funnel to pour the gasoline into the tank.

I remember my dad filling up 5-gallon gas cans at the service stations. He'd use them when he went hunting.

In 1905, Sylvanus Bowser invented the first hand operated, selfmeasuring gas pump which made the process safer and more efficient than pouring from a can. On the left is a photo of his pump.

In 1905, the world's first dedicated gas station was built in St. Louis, Missouri. This new model allowed drivers to pull up and purchase fuel without transferring it from a canister.

However, it wasn't until 1913, when Gulf Refining Company opened the first drive-up gas station in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, that the concept of a modern fuel station really took off. The station was designed by an architect with an overhanging roof for weather protection and had attendants to serve customers. They also distributed free road maps. On its first day, the station sold thirty US gallons of gasoline at 27 cents per gallon.

In 1903, Henry Ford began his motor company. Ford is credited with making cars affordable to the common man through the concept of the assembly line. His Model T was built from 1908 to 1927. It originally cost \$850 which was equivalent to eight months average salary. By 1927, the Model T sold for \$300, making it very affordable. The automobile had a 10-gallon fuel tank under the front seat, and it generated twenty horsepower with the top speed of 40-45 miles per hour.

As cars became more popular, the demand for more gas stations increased. Architects were hired to create gas stations.



Also, the demand for better roads grew. President Dwight D. Eisenhower is credited with creating the interstate highway system, which was established by the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1956. His experience with Germany's **Autobahn** and a challenging 1919 crosscountry military convoy convinced him of the need for a high-quality, highspeed highway system for national defense and commerce.

Why were these stations so successful? Well, again, we have to look back at history and ask some questions. Karl Benz, currently of Mercedes-Benz fame, built the first self-propelled vehicle in Germany in1885. His invention started the frenzy for faster travel.



Today our gas stations have progressed They have EV charging stations; car washes; snacks and food inside, offering a wide assortment of items to eat; rest rooms; and play areas.

Some of the large trucking stations even have showers.

Oh did I forget to mention, they also sell gas!
